The conference will focus on how to ensure the long-term protection of drinking water resources, one of NH's most important natural resources and highest priority for public water systems according to the American Water Works Association. Grants

State Funding for Conservation

NHDES Source Water Protection Program Funds

The Drinking Water and Groundwater Trust Fund (DWGTF) has allocated \$2 million for this year's grant round and NHDES is currently accepting pre-application for Source Water Protection. Grants are available to cover up to 50% of total project costs and are capped at \$500,000 per project. To be eligible for consideration, a project must permanently protect an area containing "high-priority water supply lands", defined as land that falls within either: a wellhead protection area, hydrological area of concern, or a high-yield stratified drift aquifer classified as GA2. Eligible lands can be viewed in the **Source Water Protection Eligible Lands Mapper**. Pre-applications are due May 21, 2025; and if eligible, applicants are invited to submit a funding application. NH Land and Community Heritage Investment Program (LCHIP)

The New Hampshire Land and Community Heritage Investment Program is an independent state authority that makes matching grants to NH communities and non-profits to conserve and preserve New Hampshire's most important natural, cultural and historic resources. Through this investment program, every \$1 in resources brings back more than four times local, private, federal funds, and helps to secure NH's greatest business advantage: The quality of life and traditional values of our state. NH DES Aquatic Resource Mitigation (ARM) fund

The Aquatic Resource Mitigation Program aims to sustain the functions and values of aquatic resources in New Hampshire through protection, enhancement and restoration of wetlands and streams, to compensate for the aquatic resources lost from development and other impacts. When wetland functions and values will be lost due to development, funds may be placed into the ARM fund. Fees collected by ARM are pooled within the same major watershed and then distributed as competitive grants so that the money collected is going back to the areas affected by the project. Mooseplate Grants

The State Conservation Committee's Conservation Grant Program supports and promotes programs and partnerships that protect, restore and enhance the state's valuable natural resources. The Conservation Grant Program's six focus areas include restoring water quality, creating or restoring wildlife habitat, soil conservation, best management practices for agriculture, stormwater or forestry, conservation planning, and land conservation projects.
