Keynote:

Anthea Lavallee has served as Executive Director of the Hubbard Brook Research Foundation for more than a decade, giving her a front-row seat to one of the world's most dynamic and influential ecosystem studies. She works at the intersection of science, public understanding, and environmental decision-making, striving to foster an approach to environmental stewardship that is scholarly and practical, reality-based and creative, equitable, actionable, and hopeful.

Lindsey Rustad is a forest ecologist and senior research scientist who recently retired from the USDA Forest Service after nearly three decades of studying how forests respond to a changing environment. A longtime scientist at the Hubbard Brook Experimental Forest, she has focused on climate change, extreme events, and changing seasons in northern forests. Her work spans long-term ecological research, emerging technologies, and science communication, with a particular passion for finding new ways to make environmental science accessible, engaging, and useful.

Bohannon, Andrew

Andy Bohannon, CPRP, serves as the Deputy City Manager for the City of Keene, New Hampshire, bringing decades of public service experience rooted in his lifelong connection to the community. A Keene native, he grew up participating in local recreation programs and began working for the City as a teenager. After graduating from Keene State College, Andy returned in 2004 to begin his professional career in municipal service, later leading the Parks, Recreation & Facilities Department before stepping into his current role. Throughout his career, Andy has expanded recreational programs, strengthened partnerships, and guided long-term planning efforts that continue to shape Keene's quality of life. His leadership in public-private collaborations has been especially impactful.

Boudreau, Anna

Anna Boudreau is an experienced practitioner with over 25 years dedicated to environmental conservation. A UNH alumna, Boudreau served as the Executive Director of the Strafford Rivers Conservancy (which has since merged with SELT) for 10 years. In 2000, she became one of the founding members of the Dover Open Lands Committee (OLC), which she currently chairs. In this role, the OLC evaluates parcels for conservation and assists the Conservation Commission and Planning Department with project management, grant writing, and bringing viable projects to a successful close.

Brennen, Jayson

Jayson Brennen is a volunteer member of the Litchfield Conservation Commission, but his real job is global GIS Practice Leader for a large engineering consulting firm.

Berger, Emma

Emma Berger is the Inland Wetland Permitting Section Supervisor at the New Hampshire Department of Environmental Services (NHDES). With over eight years of specialized experience in wetlands permitting, Emma brings technical knowledge and regulatory insight to her role and in workshops she participates in. In addition to her work at NHDES, Emma is passionate about education and mentorship. She has experience as an adjunct professor, where she has taught courses related to wetland science and environmental policy, helping to inspire and prepare the next generation of environmental professionals.

Callahan, Catherine (Katie)

Katie joined the NH Fish and Game Department in 2003 as coordinator of the Geographic Information Systems (GIS) Program which supports the entire Department through the collection and analysis of spatial data for conservation, management, and protection of the state's fish, wildlife, and marine populations and their habitats. She previously worked for the NH Department of Environmental Services, Water Division as a GIS specialist. Katie received a B.A. in Zoology from UNH and earned her Master's degree in Environmental Science and Policy from Plymouth State University. She is a wildlife tracking enthusiast, was a volunteer for the Canada lynx/carnivore surveys in NH, and looks forward to helping with the upcoming Northeast regional moose surveys.

Crystall, Sandra

Sandy worked for the NHDES for more than 23 years serving in the Wetlands and Watershed Management Bureaus on wetland permitting, outreach and training, and wetland bioassessment. Sandy also worked in the Drinking Water and Groundwater Bureau coordinating the source water protection land conservation grant program under the Drinking Water and Groundwater Trust Fund. Sandy is a professional wetland scientist with a bachelor's degree in Biology and has done post-graduate work in regional planning, natural resources and GIS. She is on two town boards, the Planning Board, for which she is Vice Chair, and the Conservation Commission, for which she is Chair, and on the NHACC board.

Douglas Cygan has been the Invasive Species Coordinator for the NH Department of Agriculture for the past 23-years as well as being a nursery inspector and an Authorized Certification Official for the USDA. Prior to this he was a Wetlands Permitting Officer for the NH Department of Environmental Services (DES) for 2-years, and before that he was a Senior Environmental Manager for the NH Department of Transportation's (DOT) Bureau of Environment for 7-years. In 1992 he graduated from the University of Maine, Orono, with a B.S and an A.S in Plant Science with a minor in Conservation Biology and Wetland Science.

Will is on the Resources, Recreation and Development Committee in the NH State Legislature. He is a representative from Ward 8, Nashua NH. He has sponsored numerous bills to protect the environment. Sarah Jamison is the Senior Service Hydrologist at the National Weather Service in Gray, Maine, with over 20 years of agency experience spanning offices in Missouri, North Carolina, and Ohio. These diverse postings have provided her with a broad geographical perspective on water management and emergency response. A subject matter expert in dambreaks, ice jams, and rain-on-snow flood events, Ms. Jamison has provided critical hydrologic support for more than 20 hurricanes, numerous severe weather outbreaks, and significant regional floods—including the major event of December 18, 2023. Her career is dedicated to advancing flood-risk mitigation and providing essential decision support to protect lives and property across the Northeast.

Littleton, Jeffry; Conservation Ecologist, Moosewood Ecological

Jeffry Littleton is very enthusiastic about exploring our natural world. He is the principal ecologist and founder of Moosewood Ecological LLC, having more than 30 years of experience in ecological studies and environmental education. He specializes in conservation planning, land management and stewardship, habitat restoration/enhancement, and education. Jeffry employs a systems approach to understanding the spatial dynamics of the environment, blending conservation biology with the ecology of landscapes. He uses a GIS to analyze natural resources to help guide conservation and restoration planning efforts. Jeffry served as an adjunct faculty for 17 years at Antioch University where he provided course instruction on wildlife and plant inventory techniques, forest community ecology, and interpreting past land use histories from clues remaining in our forested landscape. In addition, he currently is a member of the Cheshire County Cooperative Extension Advisory Board.

McGuigan, Jaime

Jaime McGuigan is an ecologist, conservation and wildlife biologist, and founder of Access Conservation, a nonprofit focused on connecting people with wildlife, conservation, and ecological science. She holds a master's degree in Environmental Science with a concentration in Conservation Biology from Antioch University New England and a bachelor's degree in Biology from Keene State College. Her work includes wildlife monitoring, ecological fieldwork, science education, and the use of wildlife cameras to better understand how animals use the landscape. She is particularly interested in making ecological information accessible and useful to communities, landowners, and conservation organizations.

Morrilli, Toni Lynn

Dr. Toni Lynn Morelli earned a B.S. in Zoology at Michigan State University and a PhD in Ecology & Evolution at Stony Brook University. She has spent years trekking around the mountains of California and Madagascar and Tanzania and, best of all, New Hampshire exploring how mammals are responding to climate change. She has spent ~15 years as a researcher with first the US Forest Service and now, in her current role with the US Geological Survey Northeast Climate Adaptation Science Center, using methods of knowledge coproduction, geospatial analysis, ecological modeling, and decision science to facilitate natural resource management and habitat and species conservation in the face of climate and land use change. Most importantly, she spent several years as a conservation commissioner in Massachusetts.

Jim works closely with state and local officials, businesses, and nonprofit partners to develop solutions that protect New Hampshire's lands and waters while strengthening community resilience and economic vitality.

Rogers, Shannon

Shannon Rogers, Ph.D., serves as the State Specialist of Nature Based Economic Development on the Community and Economic Development Team. Trained as an ecological economist, she focuses on how people use and value the environment and natural resources. Rogers is also an Associate Extension Professor and is affiliated with the Natural Resources & Earth Systems Science Doctoral Program at UNH. Rogers has experience working in the private sector at Industrial Economics, Inc., an environmental economic consulting firm in Cambridge, MA. Scribner, Wendy, UNH Cooperative Extension

Wendy is a Natural Resources Field Specialist with UNH Cooperative Extension. She works in Carroll County and provides research-based natural resource information and assistance to a wide range of clientele including: private landowners, licensed foresters, members of the logging and forest products industry, municipalities, schools and organizations. She specializes in forestry and wildlife. His areas of interest there were vertebrate and invertebrate zoology, ecology and evolutionary biology. Since the 1970's he's been chair of the Holderness Conservation Commission. He serves as the NHACC representative to the NH Rivers Management Advisory Council where he is the vice chair of the group. Until a few years ago, he ran many races going from 5k to marathons and did triathlons.

Spillane, Representative James

James A. Spillane is a lifelong New Hampshire native, writer, and father of three. James works as a senior technical writer, bringing the same precision and attention to detail to complex documentation as he does to his fiction.
