2023 NH Local Source Water Protection Grant Applications Are Available!

Since 1997, NHDES has made small grants to water suppliers, municipalities and other local organizations for the purpose of protecting drinking water sources. Protection projects funded through this program have included delineation of wellhead protection areas, inventorying potential contamination sources, development of local protection ordinances, groundwater reclassification, shoreline surveys, drinking water education and outreach activities, and controlling access to sources. LEARN About LiDAR

Wednesday, September 28 at 12 noon

Shane Csiki, NH State Geologist

The program will introduce the New Hampshire Geological Survey, and its constituent programs that can assist conservation commissions in their natural and cultural resources preservation work. As part of this presentation, LiDAR (Light Detection and Ranging), which provides detailed topographic representations of the Earth's surface will be discussed. LiDAR has been used to aid in Earth surface feature mapping, such as glacial deposits, floodplains, rivers, cultural landmarks and more. Uses of LiDAR in New Hampshire and its use in New Hampshire's Geologic Mapping Program will be discussed. **Register Now**
